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⇄ **We have no training practices.**

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⇄ **Shadowing for in-person and online instruction seems to alleviate a lot of anxiety and uncertainty for new hires, especially early career hires.**

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⇄ We rely mostly on peer observation, sharing materials and attendance at our university's Academic Development Program, which provides teaching related PD opportunities
